- To be admitted to the Teacher Education Program and take any 3000/4000 level Professional Education courses, students must have completed an admission application through the TEAL office, attained a "C" or above in SPED 2100 and either EDUC 1100 or EDUC 1511, passed all three parts of the Praxis Core test and attained an overall GPA of at least 2.5 in at least 30 credit hours of coursework.
- In accordance with legislation enacted in 1992 by the North Carolina General Assembly, the State Board of Governors had directed that undergraduates should enroll in at least 15 credit hours per term, thereby enabling a full-time student to complete a baccalaureate degree program in four years or the equivalent.
